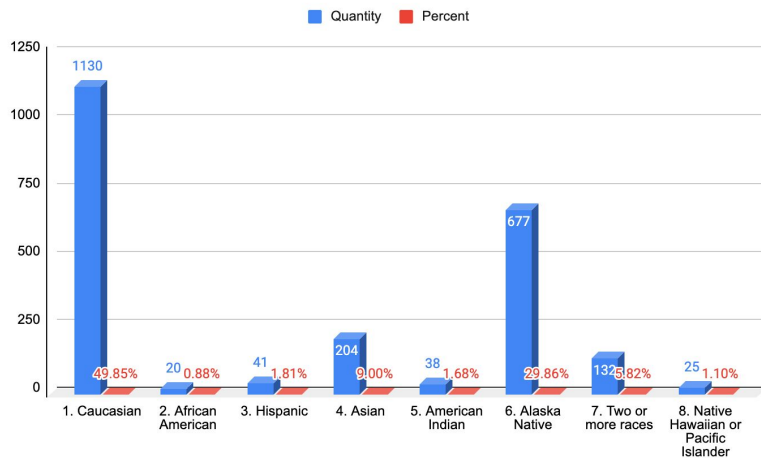

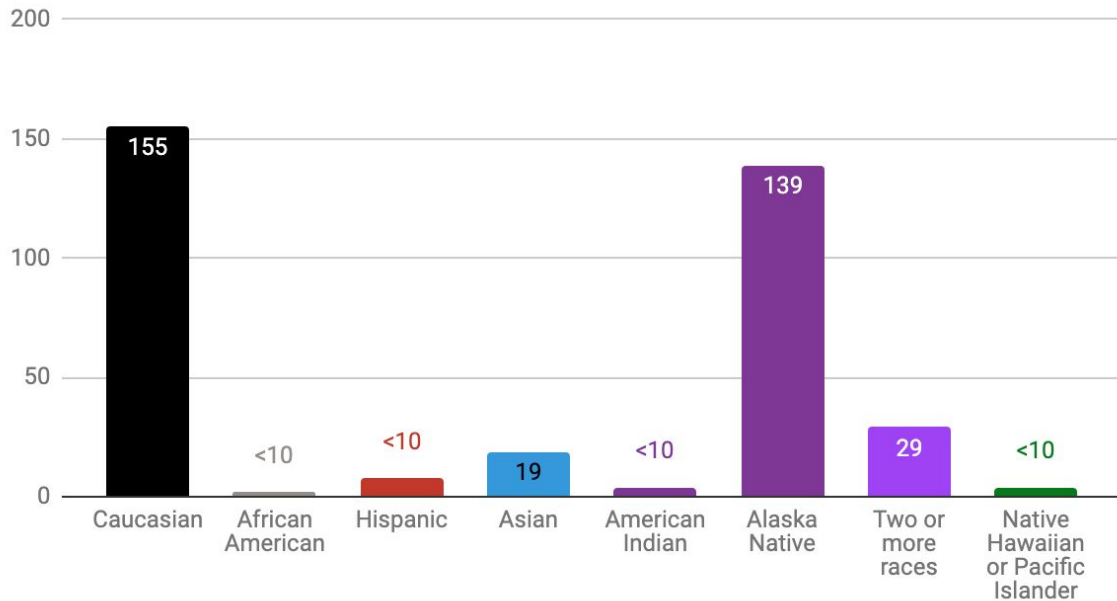

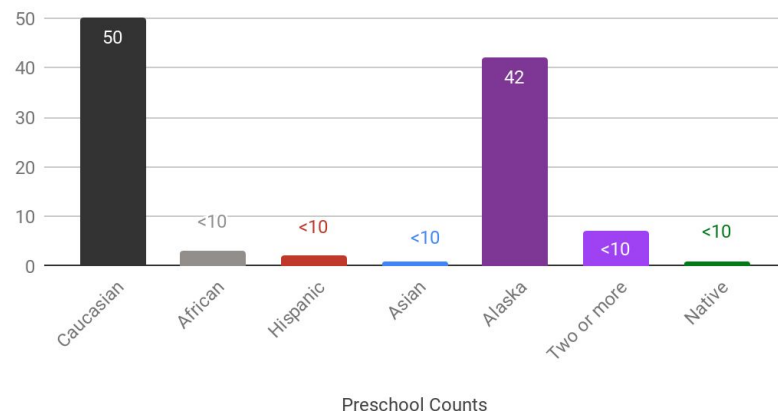
# IEA PRESCHOOL

The Federal Indian Education Act grant funds two district preschools for Alaska Native and American Indian students. The preschools are located in Ketchikan High School and Fawn Mountain Elementary.

**MISSION STATEMENT:** This program is designed to address and meet the unique educational and culturally related academic needs in respect to historical trauma and response of Alaska Native and American Indian students so that such students can meet or exceed the same challenging State student academic achievement standards adopted for all students.

**LEARNING ENVIRONMENT:** Students have the opportunity to learn and grow through a variety of experiences in a safe environment with certified teachers. Learning experiences happen through play, exploration, books, songs, finger plays, puppets, discussions, games and art projects. Each month we emphasize theme teaching and focus on learning concepts

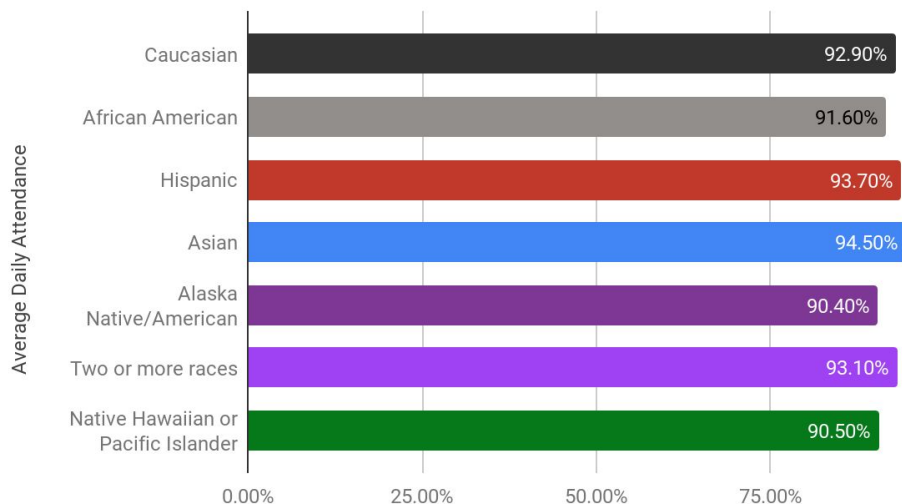

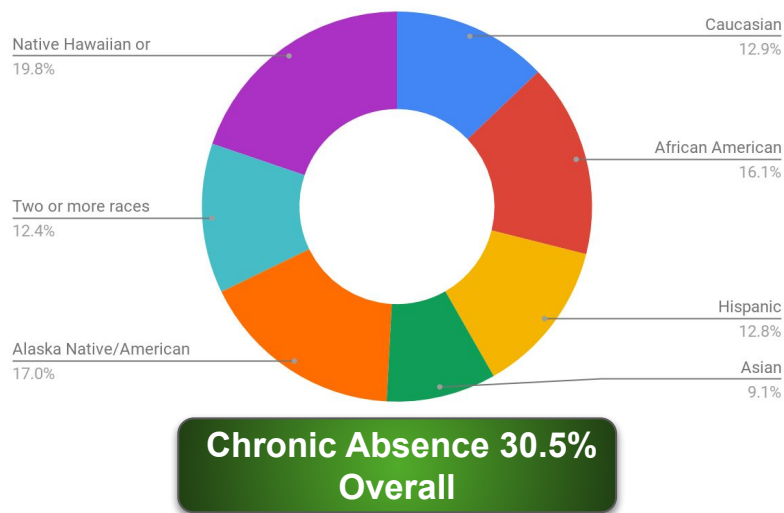

## Chronic Absence

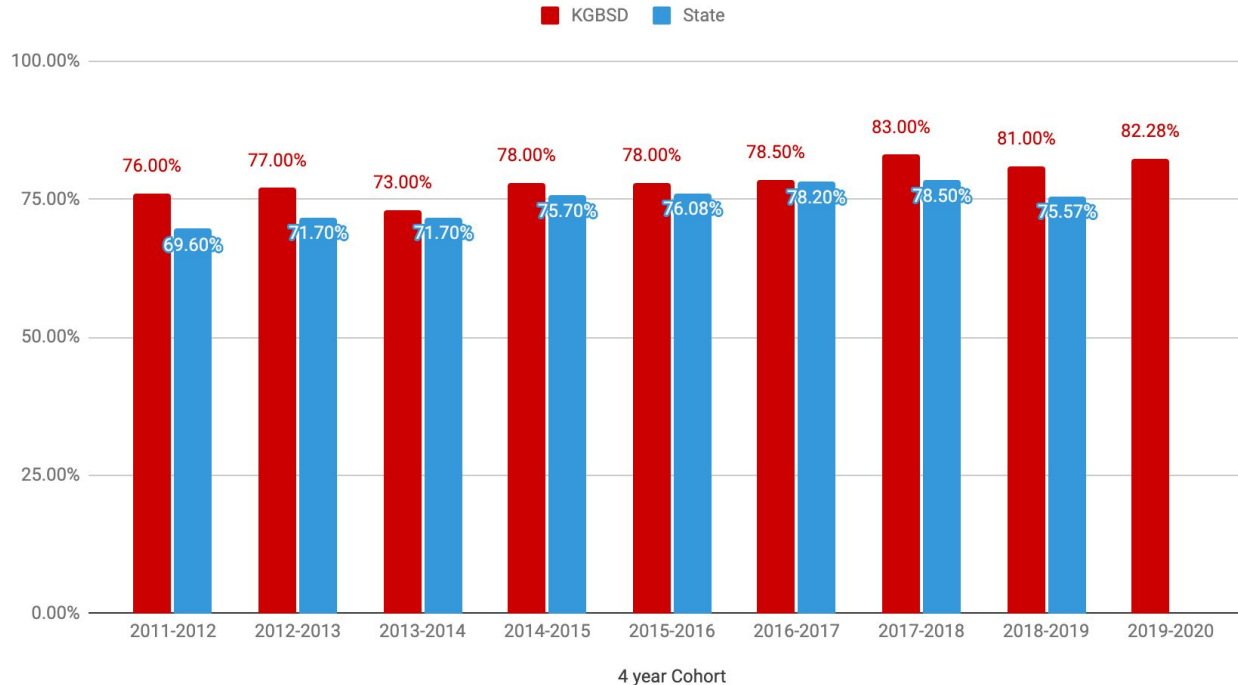


Students who are chronically absent - meaning they miss at least 15 days of school in a year, are at risk of struggling in school.

## KGBSD vs State 4 Year Cohort Graduation Rate

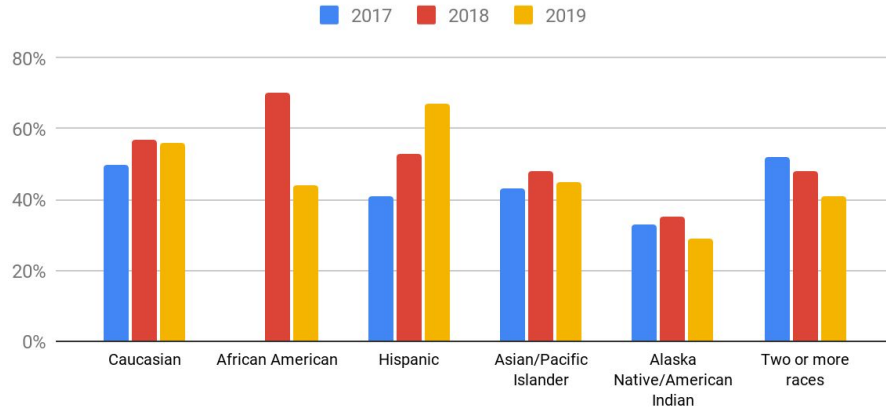


**NOTE:** There is often confusion between graduation rates and dropout rates. Dropout rates are event rates meaning they are calculated across a single year. The graduation rates are measures of cohort groups across four years. Dropout rates are calculated by dividing the total number of students dropping out of public school, in grades 7-12, by the October 1 enrollment count for all students in grades 7-12. Graduation rates and dropout rates are calculated independent from each other and are not the inverse of each other. Also, a student counted as a dropout in one reporting year may be counted as a dropout in another year.

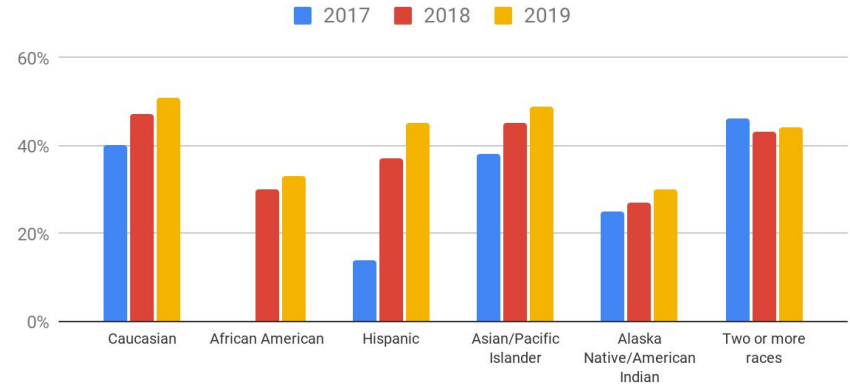
